 - (a) ... for the helmet was nine times too large for the head, which appeared situated far in the hinder part, even like the lady in a lobster, or like a mouse under a canopy of state, or like a shrivelled bean within the pent-house of a modern periwig, and the voice was suited to the visage, sounding weak and remote.
 - (b) Perhaps the best cure for the fear of death is to reflect that life has a beginning as well as an end. There was time when we were not: this gives us no concern- why, then should it trouble us that a time will come when we shall cease to be?
 - (c) The virtue of prosperity, is temperance; the virtue of adversity is fortitude; which in morals is the more heroical virtue.
 - (d) Sunday clears away the rust of the whole week, not only as it refreshes in their minds the notions of religion, but as it puts both the sexes upon appearing in their most agreeable forms, and excreting all such qualities as are apt to give them a figure in the eye of the village.
 - (e) Certainly wife and children are a kind of discipline of humanity; and single men though they may be many times more charitable, because their means are less exhaust, yet on the other side, they are more cruel and

hardhearted (good to make severe inquisitors), because their tenderness is not so oft called upon.
